Dear Parents and Caregivers,

Our theme this week is *Managing Self*. This is one of the 5 key competencies in our wonderful NZ Curriculum. So what does it mean?

This competency is associated with self-motivation, a “can-do” attitude, and with students seeing themselves as capable learners. It is integral to self-assessment.

Students who manage themselves are enterprising, resourceful, reliable, and resilient. They establish personal goals, make plans, manage projects, and set high standards. They have strategies for meeting challenges. They know when to lead, when to follow, and when and how to act independently.

What does it look like in our school?

This key competency looks like:

- **Being prepared for learning**
- **Looking forward to new learning opportunities**
- **Completing tasks**
- **Persevering when the task is challenging**
- **Managing emotions in a socially appropriate way**

We continue this theme next week so it would be a good opportunity over the weekend to talk to your child and check what they have learned and what they are practising in terms of managing themselves at school. You could share times when you are challenged and how you manage yourself at those times.

In the next few weeks we will have some contractors on site – the first group will be completing the earthquake strengthening in our Hinau Block. This will take some time and whilst it may be a little inconvenient it will most certainly ensure the classrooms in this block are well above the safety code.

The second group of contractors will begin work on the development of our Rata block. This is an exciting development in terms of being able to create a discovery place for our young students. We will keep you posted in the next couple of weeks about progress and plans. Make sure you have liked our Facebook page as this is our main source of sharing photos and news with you.

UNIFORMS:

It is our expectation that students wear the correct school uniform daily. If you are unsure of the requirements please ask the office. All students need to wear the correct blouses, school shirts, shorts and appropriate plain black shoes.

All students from Year 3-8 are required to have a PE/ Sports shirt. These are available from the school uniform shop.

Hats must be worn in Term One and Term Four. If your child does not have a hat they will be asked to sit in the shade and will be unable to play – NO HAT NO PLAY.

Curriculum Statement

Discovery: (Rata)

A discovery curriculum promotes learning through exploration, meets social, cognitive and co-operative needs of the individual.

Integrated: (Rimu)

An integrated curriculum involves the teaching of a diverse range of learning experiences and skills which enable the students to begin to select activities and pursue these independently and co-operatively.

Co-operative: (Hināu)

A co-operative curriculum enables students to work together to develop learning skills and participate in varying groups through a wide range of learning experiences.

Self-Directed: (Totara)

A self-directed curriculum enables students to plan what they learn, when they learn and how they learn. It is a focus on the process of learning.

EOTC 2017

Last year we experienced a very positive start to our year when we participated in our Education outside the classroom week. It was a great chance for teachers to get to know their students in a more relaxed setting and to meet so many parents so early in the year.

We have made a decision to do the same this year.... Our EOTC week will be held in Week 4 – Monday 20 February to Friday 24 February.

Our theme is the taonga of our community. We have used this opportunity to plan for the teaching of water safety so as to make our students aware of the danger of water in a range of settings. You will have seen on the news the tragic deaths by drowning.... Most of these do not happen in the local swimming pool but rather at the beaches and rivers that make our community so beautiful. Our focus is to teach our students how to make decisions which will keep them safe while at the beach, river or parks.

Each whanau have planned two out of school trips and they will fill you in with more detail next week. I know they will also be looking for parental support.... If you can help that would be great. A reminder that we cannot take parents and pre-schoolers so keep this in mind if you offer your help.

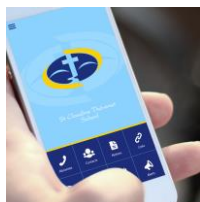
